Partnership story

Shelley and Kibble

Shelley was partnered with now retired black Labrador Kibble in January 2014. This is her story.

"I have Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, a condition that causes dislocations throughout my body. Some days, I'm able to move around, but other days, I'm confined to a wheelchair.

"Before being partnered with Kibble, I struggled with frequent dislocations and relied on my husband and children for everything. Discovering Canine Partners was life-changing for me.

"With Kibble by my side, I was more independent and confident. He did so much for me, from helping me get out of bed to doing my laundry and shopping. He picked up everything I dropped and was always there to comfort me when I was feeling down. Thanks to Kibble, I was never alone, and could go out and do things I



never thought I could do before. He massively improved the quality of my life.

"Even now that he has retired, Kibble is always there to keep me company. His great sense of humour never fails to cheer me up.

"I applied for a successor dog in February 2023, and prepared for Kibble's retirement by leaving him at home more often, letting family members walk him, and bringing in his friend, Pebble, to help with some of his favourite tasks.

"While waiting for my canine partner successor, I've been feeling anxious about not having a dog by my side."

"I don't want to go back to relying on other people for help with personal tasks. I don't like going out without Kibble, so I've been staying in more. Recently, I dropped my phone and tried to reach for it, resulting in a cracked rib. I felt embarrassed and in pain, and had to ask for help.

(6) I feel safer and more comfortable with a canine partner in public, and people are more likely to engage with me.



"Kibble changed not only my life but also the lives of my entire family."

"My children could go to school and after-school clubs without worrying about me, and my husband could go to work without constantly checking in on me. I've been feeling more anxious since Kibble retired, but I'm holding out for a successor dog that I know will be an absolute life saver for me

"Having a canine partner has given me confidence and the ability to accomplish anything. They are not just life changers but life savers. I am thankful for the past 10 years with Kibble and am convinced that if I hadn't got him, I wouldn't be here today."

Canine Careers

While not all our dogs go on to become canine partner assistance dogs, they still play a crucial role in providing support and companionship.

Canine home assistance

Our home assistance canines provide life-changing physical and emotional support within the home.

While they don't have public access rights or wear our distinctive purple jackets, home assistance canines are still highly trained. These dogs have mastered essential skills and meet our high standards for leash walking, recall, and overall behaviour. They thrive best in calm, home environments.

Once partnered with a disabled person, these dogs provide essential support at home, both physically and emotionally. They're an excellent choice for those who need assistance at home but not in public or at work.

Many who have been partnered with a home assistance canine report greatly improved quality of life.

The programme is also beneficial for working canine partner assistance dogs who require a gradual transition into retirement.



Canine companions

For those partners who need less physical or task based support, our dogs can support them as a canine companion. They offer invaluable companionship, encourage exercise, and provide all the wonderful benefits of pet ownership to households where a member has a physical disability.

Other careers

Some dogs join our in-house breeding programme and have the vital job of providing the next generation of life-changing canine partners.

We also place some dogs as amazing Dog Ambassadors, who educate people about Canine Partners' life-changing work and demonstrate the skills our dogs need to transform lives.

Working with other Assistance Dog Charities (ADUK)

We work closely with other ADUK charities to identify, train, and place a special type of assistance dog: a dual-purpose dog.

We partner with organisations such as **Hearing Dogs for Deaf People** to provide dual-purpose assistance dogs like Rico (pictured). Rico has been trained to walk alongside mobility aids and perform both task and sound work in various environments.

What makes a dual-purpose dog special?

These incredible dogs are trained for two roles, requiring a high work ethic and the ability to excel in both.

The dual-purpose training process:

We work together with the other ADUK charity to identify a dog with the potential to become a dual-purpose canine. The dog then receives training from both charities to ensure they master the necessary skills for both roles.

Applicants interested in a dualpurpose dog must meet eligibility criteria and be assessed by both Canine Partners and the partnering ADUK charity. If a suitable dog is identified, the applicant will attend a matching visit.

After a successful match, the dog receives additional training at both charities before embarking on the Partnership Training Course with their new partner.

Throughout the dog's working life and retirement, both Canine Partners and the partnering ADUK charity will provide ongoing support.

By working together, we can make a greater impact on the lives of disabled people.



Rico's Advanced Trainer said:

"Training a dual-purpose assistance dog is a unique experience that requires patience, understanding, and collaboration. It's a wonderful opportunity to combine the strengths of both charities and produce highly skilled and adaptable assistance dogs. With the right training and support, these incredible dogs can transform people's lives, and that's what makes our work so fulfilling."



After some research, we discovered that due to the nature of our dogs' training and work requirements, as well as the breeds we use, they can be more susceptible to musculoskeletal conditions. We decided to address these issues head on.

We started a physiotherapy programme, or 'puppy pilates', tailored to each stage of a dog's life with us, from newborn puppy right through to retirement. Our goal is to prevent musculoskeletal issues and develop healthier, more physically robust dogs. We have successfully delivered this programme at both puppy and advanced training, and we are seeing a tremendous impact on our dogs.

We are delighted to share that thanks to this proactive approach, a couple of our dogs have made full recoveries from imbalances in their muscular structure and posture. Instead of being withdrawn from the training programme, they can now go out on partnership and, with a maintenance routine, should have no further complications.

we have also noticed that some of these

dogs have been experiencing gait and soft

tissue problems that require physiotherapy.

Our proactive physio programme has been a game-changer for our dogs. It improves their health, reduces the likelihood of injuries, aches, stiffness, and lameness, and helps with their behaviour. By addressing potential musculoskeletal issues before they develop, we are ensuring that our dogs are healthy throughout their lives with us.

Training your dog not to jump up

Dogs often jump up to get our attention, whether they're excited to see us or worried about something. Jumping up can become a habit if it's rewarded with attention, so it's important to teach your dog not to do it.

Many people inadvertently encourage jumping up when their dogs are young and cute, but this behaviour can become confusing and problematic as the dogs grow older. Don't worry if your dog jumps up - with the proper training, you can teach them to behave differently.

Here are some tips to help you stop your dog from jumping up

- Stay calm and quiet if your dog jumps up and reward them when all four paws are back on the floor.
- Reward your dog for keeping all four paws on the floor, especially in situations when they might jump up.
- When meeting people outside, ask them to step back to give your dog space until they are calm. Reward all calm behaviours and try again.



- If your dog struggles with people coming into your home, baby gates are a great way to help manage the situation and give your dog time to relax after the initial excitement. Reward all calm behaviours and then try introducing them to your guests.
- Make a list of situations in which your dog might jump up and quickly interact with them before they do.
- Don't tell your dog off for jumping up, as it could be self-rewarding for some dogs and distressing for others.
- Be consistent with your training and teach your dog to sit when meeting people.
- Use high value treats to reward your dog for not jumping up and keeping all paws on the ground.
- Set your dog up for success by being prepared with plenty of treats when out for walks or when visitors come to your home and thinking ahead so you can pre-empt the behaviour.

Monday

To start the week,

I started the day with admin, including writing up a report from yesterday's aftercare visit. I had a virtual call with a partnership to discuss their dog's health and conducted a training session with two Dog Ambassadors, teaching volunteers loose lead walking, dealing with distractions, recall, go-to-bed games, toy play, and car loading.

Wednesday

I discussed access rights with a partner and wrote an email to a food and drink establishment to address an issue where the partnership was refused access. I also held a meeting to plan the next educational webinar for our community of volunteers and partners. I had a phone call with a Fosterer volunteer about a dog being fostered after their partner passed away, supporting those involved in creating these special partnerships.

Thursday

I met with colleagues over breakfast to see each other face-to-face now we work from home. Then I visited the new partnership for their second visit of the week. We concentrated on tasks in the home, including practising the visitor routine and consensual handling. We also worked on splint and shoe retrieval, and taught a 'get help' command. Finally, we discussed the bronze award - one of the 'milestone' certificates we give our partnerships.



Friday

I visited a partnership for a six-month progress report. We conducted a health check and went for a walk to the park, where we practised recalls and basic obedience. The dog enjoyed playing with her frisbee and socialising with other dogs. Finally, we reviewed the dog's 'emergency down' and 'down wait' skills, and discussed how to progress these for their gold award. Afterwards, I returned home to complete aftercare reports and more admin. Another week complete!
